

FIRST YEAR STUDENTS OF HILLEL (FYSH) BOARD

MaP Board oversees Vanderbilt Hillel's social programming efforts and major events of Vanderbilt Hillel. MaP works to plan events for

students across campus including Fall Fest, Hillel Date Party, Hillel Formal, and our annual Superbowl party. This year, MaP hosted "Mean Girls" and "Italian" themed Shabbat dinners, a self care night with massage therapists and spa treatments, and Hillel's March Madness Bracket.

HILLEL OUT 'DORES



Hillel Out'Dores is a community passionate about exploring the natural beauty of Middle Tennessee with a Jewish lens. Join friends on monthly hikes, raft trips, and overnights that get students off campus and into the wilderness. This year, our students

hosted hikes at Harpeth Hike and Hidden Lake. This group is ending the year with a kayaking trip down the Harpeth River. Indoor programming during the winter included an indoor climb at Climb Nashville West, a trip to the Nashville Farmer's Market, and ice skating.

ATZMI

TIKKUN OLAM

CHALLAH FOR HUNGER



Challah for Hunger is a national organization with individual chapters at college campuses across the country. Students meet

bi-weekly to make challah from scratch and sell the loaves on campus. Proceeds from the bake sales go directly to hunger organizations including Mazon. Challah for Hunger is more than just a bake sale - it provides opportunities for leadership, entrepreneurship, and social justice awareness, both locally and globally.

TIKKUN OLAM MAKERS (TOM)



Vanderbilt is proud to support the Vanderbilt University chapter of Tikkun Olam Makers. These students, from a variety of diciplines,

unite to create and engineer solutions for individuals with disabilities. This year, students hosted their 6th annual Makeathon with 150 participants and built 14 different projects- the largest number of projects in the Vanderbilt group's history. They hosted their first ever toy adaptation event in the spring, 40 students came together and successfully adapted 30 toys to make them accessible to all children.

GIFT OF LIFE



Vanderbilt Hillel partners with Gift of Life, an organization whose mission is to help cure blood cancer. Vanderbilt Hillel students run

swab drives both on campus and in the community to add people to the donor registry to save lives. This year, students collected close to 1,000 swabs to save lives.

RELIGIOUS LIFE

SHABBAT



Every week, we offer student-run Shabbat services and free kosher Shabbat dinner. Vanderbilt Hillel offers both Conservative

and Reform services for the High Holy Days and provides programming for other Jewish holidays such as Sukkot, Purim, and Passover. Each week, our students come up with weekly themes to incorporate into services. This year we had themes such as Tot Shabbat, Bring Them Home Shabbat, Israel Shabbat, NCJW Repro Justice Shabbat, and Camp Shabbat.

ROSH HASHANAH SEDER



This unique Vanderbilt Hillel tradition combines the structure of a Passover seder with the themes of

Rosh Hashanah to give students a meaningful hands-on ritual experience around the dinner table. In addition to our general seders, specific student cohorts enjoyed their own seders such as First Year Students of Hillel, Seniors, Belmont, and graduate students.

SUKKOT

Students gather in the sukkah for meals, meetings, and programs. Our sukkah is an easy way for students to fulfill the mitzvah of the holiday even by just stopping in to study. Some of the Sukkot programs from this year consisted of Sukkot Wine and Wisdom for seniors, Pizza in the Hut, and Shakshuka in the Sukkah.

PASSOVER



Beyond the seder table, Vanderbilt Hillel offers social and traditional opportunities for students to make

Passover meaningful for them for the entire eight days. Students gather for matzah pizza making, text-based learning, and our famous matzah brie brunch buffet.

EDUCATION

JEWISH LEARNING FELLOWSHIP COHORTS

Vanderbilt Hillel's Jewish Learning Fellowship (JLF) is a 10-week seminar for college students looking to explore Judaism on their own terms.

Ancient Wisdom for Modern Well-Being



Ancient Wisdom for Modern Well-Being is a 10-week experiential, conversational seminar for undergraduate

students looking to deepen their understanding of and relationship to wellbeing and Judaism. This year, our students met weekly over nourishing meals to discuss Jewish wisdom around their relationships with themselves, others, and their spirituality.

Kol Yisrael

This year, students engaged in the Kol Yisrael program, which is a series that explores the Jewish diaspora relationship to Israel, looking to classical, rabbinic, and modern Jewish wisdom to engage in a contemporary understanding of peoplehood, responsibility, home, and homeland.

HOLOCAUST LECTURE SERIES



The Holocaust Lecture Series is the longest-running lecture series of its type. This year, our speakers included survivors Mark Schonwetter and Jenny Kalsner, grandson of Holocaust survivor and author Philippe Sands, and Francine Hirsch, Chair of Russian History at University of Wisconsin Madison.

ISRAEL



MIZNON

Miznon is a program that provides an opportunity for students to learn about Israeli culture through cuisine and cooking. This year, students made falafel, sufganiyot, hamantaschen, sabich

(Iraqi-Jewish sandwich), leek latkes, and chocolate balls. They also are making "memory recipes" to explore the stories of fallen soldiers.

TAGLIT BIRTHRIGHT ISRAEL-CAMPUS TRIP AND ONWARD PROGRAM



Students are led through Israel by Jewish professionals and will experience Jewish history and Israeli culture through unforgettable tours, hikes, and unique activities.

Vanderbilt Hillel's Onward Israel Experience is an immersive internship program offering resume-building placements in a wide variety of opportunities in the greater Tel Aviv area for two months.



VOLUNTEERING IN ISRAEL

This year, nine students volunteered in the south of Israel over winter and spring break.

Their activities included agricultural volunteering, meeting with Israelis living near Gaza who were affected by the war, programming with young Israelis, and listening to a speaker who specialized in the geopolitical conflict, and organized Shabbat dinner/led Shabbat rituals.



ISRAEL SUMMIT

Ten Vanderbilt Hillel students attended the Israel Summit, hosted by Hillel International, which included two days in Atlanta with student leaders from all over North America gathering to learn about Israeli advocacy on campus.

To celebrate the start of construction on its building renovation, Vanderbilt Hillel hosted a groundbreaking event on February 25, 2024. The building celebrated its 20th year with a clear need for building upgrades for security, the meat kitchen, and office and programmatic spaces. With a large grant from the Benjamin D. and Ruby G. Schulman Foundation and gifts from generous Kitchen Naming and 20th Anniversary donors, Vanderbilt Hillel has raised over 2 million dollars for the building renovation.

FUNDRAISER HONORING GOLDIE AND SYLVIA

A large part of Vanderbilt Hillel's 20th Anniversary campaign efforts will go towards renovating the meat kitchen. Despite the cramped and poorly equipped kitchen, Sylvia Shepard and Goldie Shepard have spent thousands of hours cooking Shabbat and holiday meals for Vanderbilt Hillel students for almost 20 years. In the summer of 2023, Vanderbilt Hillel launched its "Kitchen Naming Campaign." Thanks to its generous Kitchen Naming Donors, Vanderbilt Hillel raised over \$400,000 towards renovating the meat kitchen. The success of the campaign culminated in the annual fundraiser honoring Sylvia Shepard and Goldie Shepard on November 12, 2023. Goldie and Sylvia were honored, and the meat kitchen was named, "The Goldie Shepard and Sylvia Shepard Vanderbilt Hillel Kitchen."
